This is my 50th and last Chairman's Corner since becoming Chairman some 17 years ago. At the Annual General Meeting in June I will be relinquishing my post in time for my 70th birthday. A while ago I promised my illustrious predecessor Ron Ockelford that I wouldn't beat his record breaking 21 years as Chairman and I haven't!

At our last Executive Meeting in May we spent a significant amount of time on the vexed question of GDPR. As you have probably heard from lots of organisations about what they are doing I'll keep ours brief. Parents will have had an email from Alys about the specific details we keep and how to check and confirm them, and we have set up a sub-committee of the Executive to ensure we are fully compliant with both the law and spirit of GDPR both now and in the future. We have seized the opportunity to cleanse our archives of out of date and irrelevant documentation - this has already improved the amount of physical storage space we have free! We want to keep a certain amount of historical data about the Group but this will be limited and held under improved security. On a separate subject we have decided not to increase our membership fees this year although, as I've mentioned before, they are not sufficient to cover even the fixed costs of running our HQ - heating, lighting, rates, etc. We only survive through the fund raising activities that we run so please support these activities if you can - it helps to keep your fees low.

We will be holding a "Celebration of our Scouting Year" over the weekend of 22nd to 24th June 2018 in the form of a Group Camp. It is at the Downe Campsite based in the Competition Field, near Bridger Lodge, Downe Activity Centre. On the Sunday we will be holding our AGM at 12noon and all are invited to attend this. As an inducement there will be a light lunch available afterwards.

In a long tradition of this column I'm afraid I once again need to appeal for help! We are always looking for new leaders so please consider whether you can help even if only on a part time basis around things like work commitments. More specifically, we are actively looking for a new treasurer as our current Treasurer has been in post even longer then me and has now moved to North Devon making some aspects of his role a little tricky. So, what have we done since the last exciting instalment of the adventures at the 3rd West Wickham Seeonee Cub Pack? We have

We opened the Summer term with the annual St Georges Day Parade which took place in Petts Wood this year and terminated in Crofton School with speeches from the mayor of Bromley & District Commissioner.

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Our first Monday night activity was a Games Evening at HQ with special emphasis to build good teamwork in their Sixes.

Good Teamwork and basic skills was the next challenge for a team of Five Cubs who entered the District Cub Scout Challenge at Down Scout Camp. We did not win but is the learning and participation that counts and gaining new experiences with varying challenges.

The Night Hike took us from HQ to the Lime Tree Entrance of Well Woods in Coney Hall around the back lanes & paths on a long walk with a few wide games in the Well Woods field. A good healthy exercise for all and showed the Cubs their local area.

The lovely Bank Holiday Monday allowed us to meet that week on a Wednesday evening at Coney Hall REC to join our sister Wontolla Cub Pack for some environmental clean up and then "Rounders in the Park".

Next up we prepared for our novelty camp at the London Zoo Bug House by challenging the Cubs with what they need to take to this type of camp. Most got the basics of a pillow & sleeping bag but forgot things like a suitable carry bag and tooth brush.

The London Zoo Bug Camp was attended by a limited amount of our Cubs who filled the available spaces with Wontolla Cubs, River & Brook Beavers within hours of the camp announcement. The Bug house was a great sleep over venue amongst all the bugs big and small, especially when a handler brings out a few to show the Cubs & Beavers at close hand. The Bug Camp was a very enjoyable experience allowing all to see the animals in a different light with no crowds. We were able to view lions, lamas, flamingos, tortoises & parrots in their cages at a time when some animals come out for the night to hunt etc. After breakfast the next morning we had a private tour of Otters, Meer cats, the Rainforest enclosure and ended up with the Penguins. We then gathered our equipment and hiked through Regent Park back to the underground in the glorious sun shine that helped make the camp on route home to Hayes Railway station. We finished off half term with a walk around High Elms Country Park hopefully learning all about the Country Code. The Cubs now know the majority of how to act in a country environment. Unfortunately, they still have not learned to be quiet so as to not disturb & scare off the wildlife around them during their walk. Still an ongoing mix of let's have fun & Scouting!
