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

With the gradual reopening of the HQ building following the relaxation of Covid restrictions the maintenance team has had a little more work to do. Currently we meet on an ad hoc basis at fairly short notice when the weather looks fine!

Recent activities included replacing a large wooden panel near the entrance which had rotted. We have now sealed it in under aluminum sheet so hopefully it won't rot again. We have also done some work on the grounds and repainted the front gates plus various doors at the car park side of the building. While doing this we found that rot had also penetrated the front window frames so we have arranged for these to be replaced by double glazed units which should also be more secure and warmer. Doug has also been getting on with painting over the graffiti on the side of the garage and Askold and Liam have worked on the grounds.

We have carried out all our regular checks such as testing the emergency light system and checking that the sewerage traps aren't blocked (ugh!) and undertaken some extra ones that Head Office asked to be done before building are fully reopened. My thanks also to Ron, Terry, and Keith for their support.

We plan to get back to a more regular and organized approach to maintenance after Christmas and will be looking for a few more volunteers – you have been warned!

"Is there anything else I could lay on the shelf?"


When I was young my slippers were red,




# Position of badges on uniform

#### Beaver scout uniform




#### Cub scout uniform

## Beaver Bits - River Colony

We returned from the Summer Holidays refreshed and ready to start a new year of scouting with the Beavers. Following the swimming-up of three Beavers at the end of last year, we welcomed five new Beavers and one joining the Group from 1st Biggin Hill. The section currently stands at 20.

As some of you may be aware this year marks the 35<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the founding of Beavers. To mark this important milestone, we have introduced a number of 35 themed activities for the Beavers to take part in on various evenings this term. These include but are not limited to, keeping two balloons aloft for 35 seconds, 35 star jumps, planking for 35 seconds and a word search of 35 answers. There will be a celebration at the end of term with camp blanket badges issued to the Beavers then.

We began the term with an evening of experiments, where the Beavers learned how to create their own volcanoes with bi-carbonate of soda and to produce colourful food dye water sculptures. We completed the work on experiments later in the term with an instruction on self-inflating balloons.

The half-term came to a denouement with a visit to Coney Hill Baptist Church and the Beavers completing their Faith badges.

We try to let each Cub have the potential in their 2.5 years as a Cub to become a Sixer or Seconder. This allows them to learn and demonstrate leadership, communication skills and being part of a team, which are linked to the Team Work Challenge Badge & Team Leader Challenge Badges.

We have also been joined by two Explorers this term undertaking their Duke of Edinburgh (DofE) Awards – welcome Sophia and Louie.

So, what have we done (or got planned) since the last exciting instalment of the adventures at the 3<sup>rd</sup> West Wickham Seeone Cub Pack? We have undertaken the following, all to give our Cubs a challenge & experience, not to mention the badges!

- Learning the Cub Scout Promise with familiarisation to Cub Scouting
- Road Safety Activity Badge
- Pioneer Activity Badge
- · Wilberforce Wide games Team Building
- Fire Safety Activity Badge
- Visit a Fire Station

Our first evening of this term was to welcome our new Beavers and introduce ourselves as Jungle Book Characters showing them how we do things at 3WW Seeonee Cub Pack. We were definitely out of practice to perform our Grand Howl ceremony as we've been out and about most of the summer term enjoying activities and not allowed to meet inside before then.

We also ran our terms practice Fire Alarm drill, which went very well in evacuation timings, as long as you can stand all the Cub chatter when forming a line to walk outside to the assembly area.

Bagera then took the Cubs through the requirements of the Road Safety Badge. They practiced the Green Cross code on a live road (not too busy) & viewed the local Road signs in the immediate area. They liked to play our how not to be distracted in a car when driving game as many cubs would turn around to take part in the rear seat activity, taking their eyes off the simulated road. So, the Cubs should now know how to behave in the car. They were also tested with a number of road signs and asked where you might see one?

King Louie then tested the Cubs knowledge with the Pioneer Activity Badge. All related to the tieing of different knots and their uses. We completed the evening with our new rope skills of building a stretcher as a project to carry any injured Cub to test the stretcher assembly. Should hopefully be able to tie shoes laces now.

We then visited Wilberforce Scout Camp for Wide games to help our Cub team building & leadership skills. Classic games like hide & seek in your Sixes to find another Cub Six hiding in the dark and to work as a team being systematic in your search following a Cubs instruction. Cubs really liked to search for a hidden leader/explorer as they knew the site layout and the best hiding places.

Akela then took the pack through the Fire Safety Activity Badge. Got the Cubs to imagine laying at home in the dark in their bed and suddenly hear a smoke alarm activate! What are they to do, jump out the window, call for mum & dad or wake the house hold? Promoted a lot of thought as to what to do to create an escape plan for their individual home environment. We showed some different home room environments and asked the Cubs to indicate any Fire hazards they could see, like a candle unattended or something blocking the fire exit. This lead on to expected behaviour around a camp fire and attending a Fire Work display.

A visit to Beckenham Fire Station finished off the first part of term where the Cubs played with fire hoses and were shown Firefighting equipment. Very much expensive big boy toys & equipment that helps to save lives. The visit was to complete requirements for the Fire Safety Activity Badge.

What activities have we waiting for the Cubs for the remaining term:

- Home Safety Activity Badge with Shere Khan
- Remembrance Evening
- Remembrance Parade
- First Aid evening
- Life Skills Evening
- · Cycle Maintenance activity Evening
- Chariot/Sleigh Racing activity Evening
- Traditional Christmas Party

So, we have a term with varied activities to keep a Cub's interest as we can still meet face to face. Many will gain a badge or two from attending all events and you parents are likely to have to sew them on their uniform.
