



Chairman's Corner



In this editorial, I thought I would share with you the role of the Group Executive Committee and why it plays a very important part in our Group.

So, what is it?

To put it simply, the Executive Committee (EC) makes decisions and carries out administrative tasks to ensure that the best quality Scouting can be delivered to young people in the Group.

Did you know that a Scout Group is a charity? Our 3rd West Wickham is a charity registered with the Charities Commission in England.

Members of the EC act collectively as charity trustees of the Scout Group. They are all volunteers who actively participate in and collaborate towards ensuring that the Group complies with the requirements of running a charity

And what does it do?

The areas that the EC covers are varied. Let me give you a taste of some that we perform at the 3rd West Wickham:

We look after the Group's property – our HQ in Tiepigs Lane. It includes the maintenance, the regulatory checks for the building and the surrounding land. We also look after the equipment that the Group owns or uses on a regular basis.

The EC also manages Group finances. This includes the rent on our HQ, the various insurances needed to run our activities safely, the gas and electricity we use at HQ, and many other items that covering everything our young people are able to do with the Group.

As part of our financial role, we also run a number of events to raise funds for the Group. We are fortunate to have a great team who volunteer specifically to run these events. This includes the Jumble Sales, the auctions and quiz or entertainment evenings.

Why is it important?

First and foremost, the EC is there to make Scouting accessible to everyone which means focusing our energy on keeping the fees you pay as parents as low as possible.

In addition to this, we also support the widest and richest access to activities that our young people undertake either in their sections or as individuals. This ranges from themed activities organised through volunteers (astronomy evenings, for instance) or arranged locally (Quasar games as an example), to sponsoring our young people to join international events like the Scout Jamboree or our traditional Family Camps.

Most of the work that our young people benefit from happens behind the scenes. Without our great team of volunteers there wouldn't be a Scout Group.

Thank you to all those who make it happen and all of you who help along the way! If you are able to join us and help, in any way, we would be delighted to welcome you.

The front windows which had rotting frames have been replaced by three new double-glazed units which should require little maintenance - although one of those units turned out to be cracked and had, in turn, to be replaced. The new units should also be more secure and warmer. A problem with the kitchen lights has been fixed while Liam has finished painting the rear of the building and Doug has continued painting over the graffiti on the side of the garage. We have carried out all our regular checks such as testing the emergency light system and checking that the sewerage traps aren't blocked and we have also replaced the outside tap with a lockable version in anticipation of switching over to a metered water supply. And that's about it until all the flora starts to grow again!

We hope to get back to a more regular approach to maintenance soon and will be looking for a few extra volunteers. More on this in due course.

Springing in to 2022

We started the last half term of 2021 with the Beavers working on junk modelling in their lodges, which they all excelled at. Indeed, we were hard pressed to choose a winner from the excellent entries, including a medieval castle with towers and an inspiring design for a new spacecraft with space helmet accessories on display too.

We were pleased to offer the older Beavers in the section an opportunity for a night away, which they had not previously had during lock-down, and in early November we hosted eight Beavers in the HQ for a Dinosaur themed night and morning of activities.

Our half term was completed with a visit from Paul the firedog handler and his very able colleague Sherlock the firedog. Paul provided the Beavers with some great advice about how to deal with fires and similar dangerous situation. Sherlock the firedog then proceeded to impress all present with his sniffing abilities to discover various accelerants and other examples of evidence all used as part of his daily work.

We sprang back into action in 2022 with a new focus on the Community Impact Badge with our vector of attack being the environment. To this end we have started by learning about the life cycle of domestic waste and discussed the importance of, re-use, repurposing and recycling. To demonstrate this and help our wild bird population in winter the Beavers worked to make garden bird feeders, which I am sure went down well in the gardens of West Wickham and Coney Hall.

We will develop this theme in the next half term when work to produce some upcycled art and venture out on a litter pick.

In addition to the new focus above the Beavers also started on their book reader badges this half term by crafting monster book marks, designing their own book covers and committing to reading five books in the coming weeks. We also celebrated Chinese New Year with some steamed buns, a chopstick race and by making red dragon garden twirlers. We ended the half term with a hobbies evening where all the Beavers were given the opportunity to share details of their pursuits which included Karate, Warhammer and the guitar! We were pleased to take in four new Beavers in January all of whom had progressed to investiture by half term.

Finally, I'd like to take the opportunity to thank our young leader Roan who has been excellent as ever and who will be leaving us at Easter. Thanks also to all of our volunteers and parent helpers without whom the section could not operate.

As the Seeonee Cub Pack has reduced in numbers this term, we have reduced the amount of Sixes to three (Yellow, Green & Blue) to accommodate. Next came the Sixer promotions within the Cub pack as we like all Cubs in their time with us to take a responsible role in their pack!

We started the Year at Yellow level alert, which allows us to meet inside for meetings, but any person aged 11 or above must wear a mask; so, our activities were planned with this in mind in the Spring term cold, dark, wintery weather.

Our First night of the term we reminded our Cubs about the Cub Scout promise and had to demo our ceremonies to our new Cubs starting. All were given a quicker reminder of what it is to be a Scout and what would be expected of them in "Doing Their Best".

We also mentioned and supplied paperwork to undertake the RSPB Big Garden Birdwatch 2022 taking place over a weekend at the end of January, which should be a fun, nature

activity that the Cubs can do with their family. Birds seen in his garden in the biggest numbers were Blue & Great Tits, but also noted a number of Jackdaws, Pigeons & Robins. Next was the Science Activity Badge Part 1 where we planted some bulbs, checked our pulse rate, watched a Coke & Mentos volcano and built our Marsh mellow structures – all challenges and good demonstrations for eager to learn Cubs who like Science.

Next up was the Personal Safety Badge, where we indicated a common-sense approach when out and about near roads, railway lines, rivers, canals & quarries etc. We also identified available Helplines & why you would call them and "Stranger Danger" & what you should do to keep safe.

It was then Chinese New Year time where we celebrated the Year of the Tiger and showed the Cubs how the Chinese like to celebrate with the Do's and Don'ts of New Year Culture, like "Clean the House" but don't give unlucky presents. We finished off the evening by sampling some different types of Chinese food, but made carful note of diet preferences and allergies for the new Cubs; we noted a vegetarian and a shell fish allergy as had prawn crackers on the menu!

As the weather was not severe for this time of the year, we went for a walk around Well Woods with torches and watched the animals in the farmer's field; a bit spooky in the dark with a pair of eyes looking back at you; visited the bomb hole, bat boxes and the hand carved benches. We then moved down to Coney Hall REC where we noted the Meridian stone pointing at Greenwich and indicated time zones either side of the line. We finished up in the play park for a few minutes for Cubs to expend any energy left.

We will return after half term with the Science Activity Badge Part 2 where we will see how our bulbs are growing, hopefully note a chemical reaction with coins and build an electrical circuit to complete the badge requirements.

Shrove Tuesday will be celebrated with the usual cook your own pancakes, which the Cubs always enjoy. We will try to keep the pancake toppings minimised so as to not give them too big a sugar fix before bed time!

So hopefully the Cubs have enjoyed the challenges so far this term and we will keep their minds stimulated with the activities still to come.
