So, what have we done (or got planned) since the last exciting instalment of the adventures at the 3rd West Wickham Seeonee Cub Pack? We have undertaken the following, all to give our Cubs a challenge & experience, not to mention the badges!

Our first evening of this term was to welcome our new Beavers and introduce ourselves as Jungle Book Characters showing them how we do things at 3WW Seeonee Cub Pack. We also ran our terms practice Fire Alarm drill, which went very well in evacuation timings; it is important to remove chatter when forming a line to walk outside to the assembly area on the grass. We finished the evening off with Team games.

Our next meeting was a local walk at Sparrows Den. We hiked a circular cross-country route past St John's church and ended up at Wickham Common Primary School as the evening was just getting dark. This gave the Cubs an insight in to the local area & paths.

We then undertook some Backwoods Cooking on the new altar fires at HQ. This was certainly a challenge as had rained most of the day and the fire wood was very wet; had to use BBQ coals which took longer to get to temperature before we could cook anything safely. Cubs did manage to cook bacon and toast marshmallows and noted the cooking principles on an open fire.

Our next planned evening became an unexpected Public Bank holiday with the sad loss of our patron Queen Elizabeth. The planned International Badge activity that evening has been rescheduled to next term.

We then held an Astronomer badge evening with a visitor coming in to do a presentation about the star systems and our universe. We even managed to pop outside in the grounds and look at the stars as it was a clear night. We now wait for the eager Astronomer Cubs to complete their badge work to gain this Activity badge as we cannot cover all the requirements in one evening. We finished the first part of the term with a "Torch Light Walk" over the common as was already dark at the start. On the open ground on the common we stopped in the darkness to turn off our torches & view many stars as there were no background street lights to spoil the view of the night sky. Amazing what stars you can see in a pitch-black environment. On the last part of our trek back to HQ, we then stopped off for some chips which were thoroughly enjoyed as Cubs do like to eat after they have done some exercise!

Our next meeting on 31st October after the half term break clashes with the very popular Halloween night of "Trick or Treat". So, to accommodate we start our evening slightly later allowing the Cubs to attend this activity and then come along in their Halloween costumes. We hold a cub forum to find out what activities they want to do and also some quizzes with prizes. A best Halloween costume prize is also awarded.


Scout Shout - Praise & Grumble
