Our First night of the term we reminded all Cubs about the Cub Scout promise and had to demo our ceremonies like the Grand Howl to our new Cubs starting. All were given a quick reminder of what it is to be a Scout and what would be expected of them in "Doing Their Best".

Our next activity evening was related to the International Activity Badge. Cubs had to choose a country and identify things like currency, language, religion, a typical meal and how they dress in that country. We then played a typical game from another country. Chinese New Year was next up on the activity evenings, where Cubs learnt about the year of the Rabbit. Cubs were shown how the Chinese like to celebrate with the Dos and Don'ts of New Year Culture; like "Clean the House" but don't give unlucky presents; a list of customs and traditions linked to a Chinese New Year. They finally sat down with chop sticks to try some Chinese food which they enjoyed before playing a typical Chinese game.

It was about time the Cubs popped out for a local "Torch Light Walk" as the mild weather was permitting. Cubs walked around Well Woods & past the local farm to view animals in the field. I believe the Cubs learned how a disabled person has to deal with their disability where their other senses become elevated

Unfortunately, we have had to cancel our Spring camp, planned for March 17-19, partially because it took us so long to find a replacement for Broadstone Warren, whose prices are now very high for the accommodation we used to book, and when we did find one, it was very late in the day, and not enough Scouts were available to make it a reasonable number. However, we now know that Buckmore Park is well worth a visit in the future, especially as it borders onto a Go-Kart track, as well as providing all the facilities that we need, as well as lots of mud!

Dipping into my treasured 28th edition copy of Scouting for Boys again, as I still await an answer to the following: (cost 10/6d, an extra 10 patrol points for the first Scout that can let me know what that is converted to decimal, and give me an estimate as to how much that would be nowadays with inflation factored in from 1953!)

As one of Baden-Powell's (BP) sections of Principles & Methods, we need to spend some time addressing behaviour in Troop meetings, as we are unfortunately experiencing a few too many instances where Scouts do not feel that they have to abide by simple rules, such as being quiet whilst a leader speaks, not wearing the correct uniform and not being a support to fellow Scouts. To quote BP quoting Sir Henry Knyvett in 1596, in a warning to Queen Elizabeth "that the State that neglects to train and discipline its youth produces not merely rotten soldiers and sailors, but the far greater evil of equally rotten citizens for civil life; or as he wrote it "For want of true discipline, the honour and wealth both of Prince and countrie is desperatelie and frivolously ruinated".

"Discipline is not gained by punishing a child for a bad habit, but by substituting a better occupation, that will absorb his attention and gradually lead him to forget and abandon the old one."

Our role as leaders is to offer a better alternative to some forms of behaviour that are not in keeping with the goals and morals of the Scouting Movement.

Looking forward to one of my favourite sessions coming up is cooking outdoors, gaining valuable experience for the Outdoor Challenge award, Night Hikes, plus Candle Making & Patrol Leaders night at HQ.

Further forward, we hope that some Scouts will come to Frylands for a St. George's Day packed with activities 0n 23rd April and brave the May camp (12-13th May). Even further forward, we plan to take as many Scouts (and Explorers) to the Bewl Water weekend camp September 1st-3rd to gain their BCU paddling and RYA sailing awards.
